The Mercersburg Theology Study Series aims to make available for the first time to a wide audience the key writings of The Mercersburg Theology, a movement which stirred up a firestorm of controversy on the American religious scene in the 1840s-1860s. Coming 125 years after the death of John Williamson Nevin, the leader of the movement, this series aims to give proper recognition for the first time to the unique contribution made by Nevin, Philip Schaff, and their colleagues. Their creative synthesis of Reformed theology, German idealism, and the Patristic roots of the Christian faith, and their penetrating and prescient evaluation of the American church made the Mercersburg Theology one of the most remarkable theological developments in nineteenth-century America, worthy of thorough study by theologians and historians. This series facilitates such study by bringing together the expertise of over a dozen theologians and historians who have studied the Mercersburg Theology to contextualize these crucial writings for modern readers in thirteen highly readable, thoroughly-annotated volumes, covering Christology, ecclesiology, the sacraments, church history, philosophy, and more.
